 **ALBA WINES : barbaresco 2004 and barolo 2003**

As every year, ALBA WINES is organizing, through WELLCOM, 4 days of tastings (blind or not, as you wish) in the center of Alba.

This morning, we had some barbaresco vintage 2004. My 2 best : Rabajà from Rocca and Rabayà from Cascina Luisin. No other big names (no Gaja).

For the 53 barolo 2003 tasted, I score above 90 points :

- the finesse and complexity of Giacosa "vigna mandorlo", quite above all the other wines.
- the finesse of Parusso "mariondino"
- the class of Ascheri Giacomo "vigna dei pola"
- the great balance of Massolino "vigna rionda"
- the lenght of Luigi Pira "vigna marenca"
- the high typicity of Fontanafredda
- the elegance of Gabutti "gabutti"

Of course, many names were not there : maybe tomorrow morning ?

General feeling about the 2003 : I was little afraid to find some harsh tanins and hard finale. In fact, we find very good balance and, something different from the past, all the wines, except maybe 6 or 8, were not overloaded with new wood : quite a progress in Piemonte ! Bravo !

Rico,

In general, what I have picked up talking with producers in the Barbaresco area in recent months seems that some want to increase the prices (in Euro!) of their 2004 Barbarescos over that of their 2001s. Not sure that will work for more than a hand full of top-producers who already have a good standing. Apart from those, the majority of Barbaresco producers seems to have problems selling their wine and I doubt they will be able to get higher Euro prices. And I doubt even more that they could maintain STABLE EURO prices for the US-market given the very weak Dollar. Not sure what their price strategy will be for the US. And given the importance of this market they really have to sit down and think a bit ... I understand that many sell 50% or more to the US, not least because during recent years of crisis in Europe the US-market has absorbed additional quantities which could not be sold in Europe. Now the first challenge is to get European buyers back on board (which should be possible given the excellent quality of the 2004 vintage) but whether this works with higher prices ...? The second challenge, perhaps the most important one, is to keep the US buyers on board and I cannot imagine that will be possible without major price concessions ...

Well, Barolo producers seem to be in a better situation. The image of Barolo is still much better than that of Barbaresco ...
